Díd (or do) you know ...

...this about traffic control in the 1920s?



We take traffic control for granted these days, but in the 1920s, before modern electrical traffic control systems were set up, a scene as (above) was common. The Detroit traffic cop is in a simple booth, with a plain light over his head as he directed traffic by hand signals.

A silent policeman as they were called at the time, as used at less active intersections, can be seen (above and below). The devices came in many variations. Early examples used a kerosene lantern, while some only used a flag.





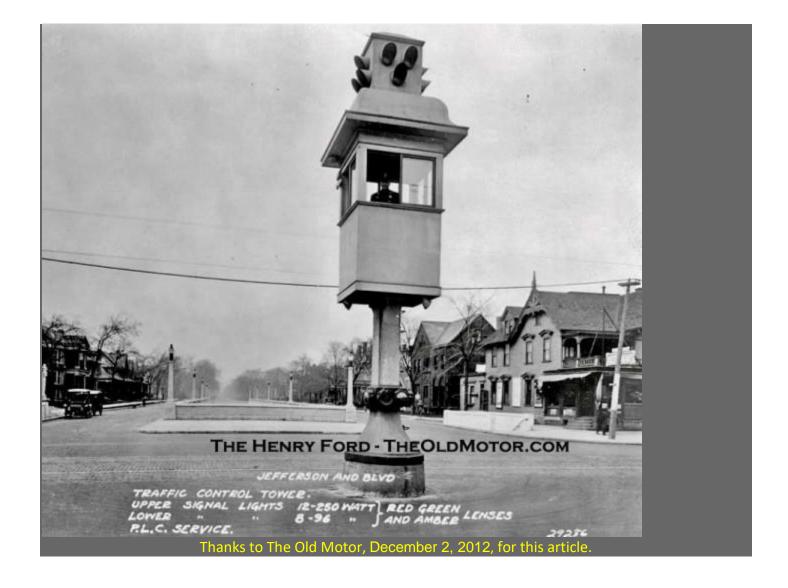


At about the same time (below) can be seen a much more deluxe enclosed booth with sliding windows, were the officer may have controlled the electric traffic lights above him from the booth as necessary.

In 1920, in Detroit, Michigan, a police officer by the name of William Potts wanted a way to efficiently control the flow of traffic. The number of automobiles on the road had increased, which meant that the number of automobile related accidents also increased. He wanted a way to make the flow of traffic more tolerable to everyone. What he had in mind was the idea of using the same theory that of a railroad signal lights. He took parts from a railroad signal and added more wires and switch to create the first four-way three-color traffic light. Pott's traffic light was first installed at a corner of an intersection in Detroit. Within a year more than a dozen of his traffics lights were installed throughout Detroit. With this four-way traffic light, it was made possible to control the flow of traffic in four directions. His invention worked very well on managing traffic flow. Meanwhile during the same time period an African American by the name of Garrett Morgan from Cleveland, Ohio, also noticed the traffic issues was on the rise since he is considered the first African American to own an automobile in Cleveland. Morgan invented an electric automatic traffic light, very much like Pott's traffic light except that it was not a four-way traffic light. Unlike William Potts, Garrett Morgan patented his traffic light on November 12, 1923. The modern day traffic light that we use today though is from William Pott's prototype that he invented.

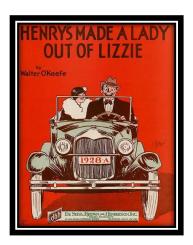


Vacuum Wipers (thanks to Bill Day, Lions Gate Model A Club, Canada)

The Restorer magazine January/February 2012 issue featured a short article on lubricating vacuum wiper motors. I had installed a rebuilt vacuum wiper on my 1930 Roadster Pickup and had been (as predicted by others) disappointed in the utterly inadequate performance of the wipers – weak, intermittent, floppy action that came to a dead stop under any acceleration or slight uphill climb. The article explained that vacuum wipers need regular lubrication – a teaspoon of light oil (I used 3in1) sucked in to the motor through a six inch bit of hose and manual movement of the wiper blade. The result was close to miraculous. The wiper now works like a damn, and is completely adequate. The rebuild was obviously well done. Apparently, frequent lubrication is necessary. For me, this was worth the subscription to the MAFCA.
